

At the recent Midwinter
Symposium, we had no
attendees for Garden Judges 1
Clinic. There are online clinics
given periodically for GJ1. All
Garden Judges Clinics will be
held at the National Convention
in Nashville this June. Please
sign up on registration form

if you plan to attend a clinic. If you have already registered but didn't mark that please let the registrar know. That way we will have an adequate number of instructors for all clinics and adequate bus space for those attending GJ2.

Garden Judges 1 Clinic will be held at the hotel on Thursday June 15. Registration at 8:30 AM and Clinic at 9:00 AM by the current schedule. Garden Judges 3 Clinic will be held at the hotel on Thursday June 15. Registration at 1:00 PM and Clinic at 1:30 PM. Garden Judges 2 Clinic will be held in a tour garden on Friday with attendees riding a tour bus together. All Garden Judges whose judgeship continues only through 2023 may attend either Workshop 2 or Workshop 3 to qualify to apply for reappointment this year. Beginning in 2024, attending Workshop 3 will be required to apply for reappointment. The in-garden Workshop 2 will still be essential for folks seeking their initial judgeship. Workshop 3, incidentally, may be taken either in a classroom setting, or online. Workshop 2 focuses on point-scoring as a consistent means of evaluating daylilies, but the class also makes clear that each judge is encouraged to evolve his or her own method of consistently evaluating daylilies. Early in Workshop 3, judges are encouraged to share and discuss with their fellow judges how he or she has accomplished that suggestion. Workshop 3 also reviews both workshops 1 and 2 material but does not delve into point scoring as a judging tool.

Nominations Now Being Accepted Regional Awards and Honors

Editor's Note: There are TWO service awards available in Region 10 as described below. The specific criteria for the Lee Pickles Service Award is currently being reviewed by the Regional Awards and Honors Committee with clarification coming soon.

1. The **LEE PICKLES SERVICE AWARD** was started in 1996 by Region 10 and is awarded to any AHS Region 10 member for distinguished and notable services rendered at the club and regional level. Eligible are those in Region 10 clubs who have devoted their time and energy to promoting daylillies as well as participating in numerous club and regional activities. Nominations should be typed and provide a summary of the activities and services which benefit the Club and/or Region and the individual/couples worthiness for this award. All nominations should be received no later than May 15 for the previous year in order that the award may be awarded at the Summer Regional Meeting. Nominations should be submitted to the current chair of

the Region 10 Awards Committee, Richard Porter, at *porterdaylily@yahoo.com*. Awards are selected by a vote of the Region 10 club presidents. Only one AHS Regional Service Award may be awarded per region per year. A dual award for two members of the same family counts as one award. Winners of this award are automatically forwarded to AHS for consideration for the National AHS Regional Service Award.

2. NATIONAL AHS REGIONAL SERVICE AWARD. As outlined on the AHS website, in 1974, the AHS Board established this award for outstanding service to AHS at the regional level. Currently serving board members are not eligible. However, Serving Regional Presidents are now eligible to be nominated for these awards. Also. a person must either be living or must have been deceased for a period of 24 months at the time of nomination for the Regional Service Award. Only one AHS Regional Service Award may be awarded per region per year. A dual award for two members of

the same family counts as one award. An AHS member will only be eligible to win a Regional Service Award once. Nominations may come from any member of the nominee's region. *These* nominations must be sent to the AHS Awards & Honors Chairman by September 1st by mail (Claude Carpenter, 6075 Vickery Pt., Cumming, GA 30040) or email (awards@daylilies.org), and must contain a summary of the nominee's worthiness for this award. The AHS Board votes by secret ballot at the annual fall board meeting, and the award is presented at the following AHS National Convention.



TRIBUTE TO JOYCE REINKE

Joyce Reinke, 86, passed away after an extended illness February 2, 2023. Joyce was a member of Region 10 for many years and along with her husband Bill owned Stephens Lane Gardens in Bells, TN. They were instrumental in establishing several plant

societies of which West Tennessee Daylily Society in Jackson, TN was one. They were there until the club folded just a few years ago. She attended the last flower show the club held and of course she and Bill won Best in Show with one of their own introductions. The Reinkes have registered over 200 cultivars of daylilies including many UFs and spiders. They attended national and regional conventions until health kept them from attending but they always donated plants to auctions for both events when possible. They would often travel to Nashville, two hours away, to enter flower shows. She was first and foremost a wife, mother, and homemaker but was very active in plant hybridizing. Joyce was always fascinated with trees and plants. She loved genetics. With Bill's love of selling plants, they made a great team. They were both certified Master Gardeners, daylily flower judges, and iris flower judges. They were privileged to travel over the world to promote their plants. Joyce was an avid genealogist. She was a painting

artist and painted off and on throughout her life. Her most popular subject was flowers and landscapes. She was also a writer and published five books over her lifetime. She is survived by her husband of over 65 years, Bill Reinke and four children, twelve grandchildren, sixteen great grandchildren and numerous nieces, nephews, cousins, and friends.

Author's Note: I am fortunate enough to live near the Reinkes. I visited often especially during gardening season and would find Joyce in her golf cart out in the yard giving orders to Bill and their handy man, Kenny Ray. She would have them meticulously caring for the large display garden, Stephens Lane Gardens. The peacocks would be scurrying around as she drove around. When she could no longer drive herself, Bill would take her anywhere in the garden that she pointed. I was always amazed that if you asked her about a particular flower, she knew exactly where it was even when it was in multiple places. It was always a treat to visit with Joyce as she reminisced. She knew a lot of people that I knew as a child. Joyce will be greatly missed.

Some of her cultivars include Femininity (spdr 2007), Curly Brick Road (spdr 1999), Amber Curls (UF 2004), August Reinke (2002), Caesar's Ghost (UF 2006), Congolese (spdr 2019), Doris Anna (near white 2000), Tennessee Red (spdr 2006), Tall Dark Handsome (UF 2012)



AHS Region 10 Business Meeting Minutes

Mid-Winter Symposium, Bowling Green, KY • February 11, 2023

(To be voted on and approved at next scheduled business meeting by general membership)

- Elizabeth Trotter, Region 10 President, opened the General Business Meeting at 5:25 p.m. She welcomed the Region 10 members at the meeting and recognized the Region 10 Club Presidents who were present. Elizabeth asked Linda Luck, Secretary, to announce a correction to the minutes from the Lexington General Meeting. It had been sent in from Lorene Crone prior to this meeting. The correction was that there had been one participant in the Exhibition Judges Clinic III instead of Clinic II as was reported. Elizabeth asked for the approval of the minutes as corrected. Claudia Wolff made the motion and Bev Crittenden seconded the motion. Approved by the members.
- Elizabeth then asked for the Treasurer's report from Vicki Louallen. Vicki reported that we had an opening balance of \$10,951.55. There was a total balance of \$26,663.02 between income and adjustments made due to the transfer in Treasurer responsibilities at the end of the first quarter. We had \$5,775.14 in expenses, and as of December 31, 2022 there was a balance of \$20,887.88. Kenny Louallen moved for approval, Greg Crane seconded and members approved it.
- Elizabeth then asked for the Regional Publicity Director, Dennis Hall's, report. Dennis indicated that a new daylily club is being started in Knoxville, TN. Their first meeting is being held in February and they already have 13 members.
- Janice Wood, Garden Judge Liaison, reported there were no attendees for the MWS offering. Workshops I, II and III will be available in Nashville this summer. Workshop I is on-line so can be taken any time but II and III must be in-person classes because they require live flowers.
- MaryAnn Duncan gave the Exhibition
 Judge report for Lorene Crone, Exhibition
 Judge Liaison, who was unable to attend
 MWS. She indicated there were five people
 in the Exhibition III clinic, four for credit and
 one who audited it. There were six attendees
 at the Exhibition I clinic, five for credit and
 one audited it. All of the clinics will be
 available in Nashville this year.

- · Richard Porter, Region 10 Awards and Honors Chair, reported that there were no nominations in 2022 for the Lee Pickles Service Award, so there will not be an award given for 2022. He also indicated that we were aware of some confusion between the Region 10 Lee Pickles Service Award and the National Region 10 Service Award. He said it has been suggested that we retire the Lee Pickles Award, but it will be studied further before a recommendation can be made to the membership. David Kirchhoff and Brenda Macy expressed concern over retiring it. Will Coltharp said the guidelines for the two awards had become blurred over the years. Brenda suggested that we tighten up the Lee Pickles criteria to make it clear, then encourage members to make appropriate nominations. Richard and his committee will work on clarifying the criteria and present further information on that award once they have done so.
- · Will Coltharp, Daylily Appeal Editor, had no report and there was no Regional Youth or Scientific report. AHS Region 10 Director, Greg Crane, said we have had three nominations for the Region 10 National Service Award, so there will be an award made this year. In an attempt to help encourage membership in the national American Hemerocallis Society, Greg is contributing "scholarship" money for four new memberships. He will give the money directly to Vicki Louallen, Treasurer, and she will make it available to the first four Region 10 members who ask for it. Greg also reminded us about the 100 giving \$100 AHS Program and said he had the special pins available for anyone who wanted to contribute during MWS.
- There was no Old Business that needed to be discussed, so Elizabeth then moved to New Business. We need three volunteers for a Nominating Committee for the next Region 10 President, as Elizabeth is in her second year of a two-year term. Bev Crittenden, MaryAnn Duncan and Dennis Hall volunteered.
- Elizabeth was sorry to announce that our current MWS Co-Chairs, Will Coltharp and Jack Alexander, are requesting assistance.
 Jack is interested in retiring from the role, although he is willing to help train his replacement. Will is willing to continue but with significant help. Jack's role has been

- largely on the technical side of the event, so we need someone with that area of expertise specifically. A couple of names were suggested to ask about their willingness to help. Elizabeth asked members to consider volunteering and to think about other Region 10 members who would have the needed skills. Will indicated he already has two speakers lined up for the 2024 event. Will also brought up the fact that MWS auction income is supposed to be used for publishing The Daylily Appeal. We have been having to use some of it to cover the costs of MWS as registration income hasn't covered them. Will said we need 70 paying registrants to break even. It was decided we will see how the income from this year's event works out and the Board will discuss it and make a recommendation at the Summer Business Meeting.
- Janice Wood said that some important members of Region 10 had died this year. She recommended that we make a donation to AHS in memory of them. Brenda Macy moved that we establish a practice of making a \$100 donation for any prior Regional Director and a \$50 donation for any past Regional President who passes. The donation should go to the Memorial Fund. The motion was seconded by Ken Louallen. Greg Crane then suggested the donation be made to the Endowment Memorial Fund, so a friendly amendment was made for the funds to go to the William E. Monroe Endowment Fund Trust. Brenda made the motion including that amendment. David Kirchhoff seconded, and the motion was approved.
- Chris Schardein invited everyone to the Region 10 2024 Summer Meeting, being held in Louisville, KY June 28 and 29, 2024. She mentioned that the gardens which were displayed by Scott Elliott and Rhonda Veroeven during their presentation that morning, are all going to be Tour Gardens at the Summer Meeting. Details of the Meeting will be included in future editions of The Daylily Appeal. Elizabeth thanked everyone who had worked so hard to help put on this year's successful MWS.
- A motion to adjourn was made at 6:05 p.m. by Ken Louallen and seconded by Dennis Hall, with approval by the members.

MID-WITER REPORT

he 32nd Annual Mid-Winter Symposium, the oldest winter meeting of AHS, is now in the history books. Everyone seemed to have a good time and the presentations were excellent as can be seen by the reviews and pictures seen elsewhere in this issue. We were able to pack 9 presentations into a busy day and half of activities including two dinners, judges' clinics and an auction. As in previous years we had to walk a narrow path of having not only presentations of notable daylily hybridizers but other topics of general interest. Everyone always wants more on topics of their own interest, but the goal is to assemble something for everyone and keep everyone happy. For the first time, a survey following the symposium was e-mailed to all attendees asking for feedback and the results are printed below. Eleven of 60 attendees chose to respond and we appreciate the responses. We will attempt to incorporate some of the suggestions if possible into the symposium for 2024. The 33rd Annual Mid-Winter Symposium has now been scheduled for Feb 9-11, 2024 at the same location, the Holiday Inn, Bowling Green, KY. Some of the speakers that I already have tentative commitments from include Bill Waldrop (Kennesaw Mountain Daylily Gardens), Troy Marden and Heidi and Charles Douglas (Brown's Ferry Gardens). Please review the financial numbers provided by the Region 10 Treasurer, Vicki Louallen, in this issue of the newsletter. The most recent MWS was not financially profitable. Historically MWS was meant to pay for itself with all auction proceeds designated solely for printing and mailing of The Daylily Appeal. This year, even including the auction proceeds there was still a loss of \$2,500.00 which means funds will need to be utilized from the existing Region 10 bank account to print and mail this issue of the newsletter. Unfortunately, for

several reasons, attendance continues to either decline or stay around 60 registrations, 10 of which are usually "comped" due to being guest speakers. Based on numbers that I determined several years ago when I was RP, for the MWS to break even without assistance from the auction proceeds, approximately 70 paying registrations are required. Regardless, the 2024 MWS is already scheduled with the contract signed with the hotel. Whether it will be financially responsible to have a 2025 MWS will depend on future decisions to be made by the current Region 10 Board along with the general membership. Those decisions will need to be made at the Region 10 Summer Business Meeting in 2023 and no later than the 2024 MWS since the hotel will be expecting a contract to be signed for 2025 at that time. In addition to these financial decisions, the only way that MWS can continue is for more volunteers to step up and assume responsibility for the different components that make up the symposium. Currently the Region 10 Board is searching for someone to assume ownership of the MWS auction in 2024 and the MWS chair position in 2025. If interested please contact a member of the Board.

MWS Survey Response

All the attendees and speakers at the 32nd Mid-Winter Symposium were invited to participate in a survey following the meeting to make it even better next year. Of the approximately 60 attendees, 11 chose to respond. On page 19 is a summary of the comments and if appropriate, responses from MWS organizers in italic parenthesis. - Coffee not provided during the meeting. (This is an expense related decision. Cost is \$35.00 per gallon for a 3 gallon container of coffee used if provided for meetings. Attendees are encouraged to utilize the coffee provided in their rooms which is free).
- Hotel staff needs to pay more attention to refreshing table water during the day (2) (Feedback will be given to hotel).
- Temperature extremes in meeting room made the room uncomfortable at times. (This will be discussed with the hotel, but this is an annual problem with our assigned meeting room. Attendees are encouraged to dress accordingly. Another meeting room is not available).
- Wineception/social area is too small for the number of people attending (Will discuss with hotel but additional space is limited and restricted if the group wants alcohol. The social could maybe be moved to the meeting room but restrictions would prevent wine/liquor from being served outside the provided wineception quest room).

Suggestions for the Future

- Would like to see more diversity of gardening presentations, not just about daylilies. (This is a daylily symposium. We will try to add one or two presentations on other plant genera, but the focus will always be daylilies. There is also a cost factor to consider. Speakers on non-daylily topics often expect significant financial reimbursement).
- Daylily Speakers show too many pictures of seedlings many of which look the same. (We cannot dictate how speakers prepare their presentations. Hopefully through feedback such as this, hybridizers will 'catch on' to what their audience wants. In our speaker selection, we try to avoid any speakers which have this reputation).
- Having the auction on Saturday night AFTER the hybridizer presentations may bring more money on hybridizer/ speaker plants (Will consider)
- Would like to see more presentations on gardens in Region 10 (Good idea – may add to the Friday afternoon programs in 2024).

- There was no scheduled event after dinner on Saturday night. (Saturday night was purposely kept open this year to allow for the auction to be carried over from Friday night if necessary. Changes may be made in 2024 to allow for a speaker after the Saturday night meal).
- Utilize a different hotel but keep the meeting in Bowling Green just to vary the venue (Will discuss but the current hotel has been very accommodating to our needs many hotels are not).
- Make the Photo contest a national contest but still restrict participation to those attending. (Good idea – this will be explored. The overall response to the Photo Contest was poor in 2022 and 2023 and it may be discontinued or moved to the summer meeting to see if there is more interest).
- Can the raffle which Doris Stonska used to oversee be brought back (2) (There was no one to do this in 2023. If a volunteer can be found to assume this responsibility, it will be featured in 2024. The same holds true for the Silent Auction. If a volunteer can be found to assume responsibility for the Silent Auction, it will be continued in 2024).
- Hybridizer Speaker suggestion one name suggested. (The name suggested was just a featured speaker in the previous year's MWS. Speakers are usually spaced out every several years to allow for changes in their hybridizing programs).
- Can advertising be done in other regional newsletters as in the past to increase awareness? (Advertising in other regional newsletters requires a cash expense and/or reciprocal trade of advertising in the Region 10 newsletter which could add additional printing expense to our own newsletter. While this may have been of benefit 10-12 years ago, it's felt that in this day of social media (Facebook, etc) and digital newsletters, it would be of little if any benefit).
- More speakers by Zoom, fewer in person to reduce meeting expenses (This will be explored and may be an option to keep MWS financially viable in the future. Transportation expenses for speakers are significant and already partially restrict our speaker invitations to those only within easy travel distance).





The 32nd Annual Mid-Winter Symposium (MWS), the oldest winter meeting in AHS, kicked off on Friday afternoon with the traditional presentation, "New Introductions and Futures". Historically, our own Jay Turman has made this presentation for over 25 years but sadly we lost Jay in late 2022. However, Brenda Macy agreed to fill in for Jay since she has been an important part of the program each year collecting images from hybridizers and assembling them into the Power Point presentation.

Several hybridizers were present and chose to present their own introductions during the program – Troy Marden, Don Wolff, Laura Teague and Scott Elliott. Based on what everyone saw, 2023 and the future promises some exciting new daylilies.

Troy Marden's introduction, H. "Miracle Baby" attracted a lot of attention during the presentation especially when everyone was made aware that one pot with multiple fans would be available for bid in the evening's auction. Not yet available to the public commercially there was fierce bidding during the auction with the winning bid of \$200 going to Patti and Ron Byerley.

Saturday Afternoon Highlights

arol Emmerich zoomed with us to show the development of her hybridizing program of Northern hardy fancy tetraploid daylilies with pleasing names. She showed the progress of her hybridization over the years. This included showing both pod and pollen parents along with the resulting progeny. She pointed out parents that had given her superior results. One of them was ALL THINGS TO ALL MEN. She has been successful with edges and teeth. There are many purple and dark maroon flowers.

Nikki Schmith thrilled us with wonderful blooms and hints on how to make our photographs better. This was not a technical program about cameras and F-stops etc, but more how to make our photos more pleasing to the eye. Nikki used a Sony 35mm camera for years and was quite pleased. Then she bought a iPhone 8 Plus and Jacob Braun prompted her about some tips to use. She has never used her Sony since. One tip is to use the cameras grid function to help us learn how to place our magic thirds to line up the objects in our photos in the most pleasing orientation. This can also help you position the empty space around your subject to frame it. Second tip is to take our photos in the Golden Hour and the Blue Hour which occur in the morning and late afternoon. The light is better at those times. "Although it is spoken of as a magic hour, it does not mean that it actually lasts an hour. The duration depends on the latitude at which we are and the time of year, so they are rather moments of light. That is why it is difficult to give an exact definition of when is the golden hour, but it can be roughly defined by the sun's position in the sky:" There are apps that can tell you when this occurs in your location. It is different in every location. One app is The Photographer's Ephemeris (Also recommended by National Geographic). The simplest sunset calculator roughly speaking, the golden hour is the one magical hour of light before sunset and one hour after sunrise. Depending on the season & your location, the time range may be a lot shorter or longer. You can find sunrise and sunset times for your location on your cell phone. Third tip, on iPhones since the 8, and on others I'm sure also, is to use the Portrait Mode of your phone. That is a simple click of setting right next to Photo setting. Portrait Mode lessens the depth of field and sharpens the attention on the subject flower. A fourth tip is to change your perspective so that you are photographing the flower face to face and not down from above. Shifting your position even just by a few inches can also help you get unwanted objects out of the way. It can also help you get shadows in the right position to improve rather than distract from your photo. A fifth tip is to remember what purpose you have for the photo you are taking.




Steven Williams delighted us with a program of his hybridizing efforts at O'Bannon Springs Gardens. One point he made that was important is, that sometimes you get unexpected hybridizing results. And even if they weren't what he expected, he felt he needed to run with it and see where it took him. He has tall ones, tiny UFO's and spidery ones, doubles, and speckled daylilies. As he lives in Ohio, most of his creations are dormants with some semi-evergreen. (see photos)

Jacob Braun took us on a visual tour of his first small home and the development of its garden and his love of daylilies. We also got to see how his new larger home with 5 acres of land is coming along. Jacob also discussed Plantstep Databases to help keep up with your inventory and to make your sales catalogs and web sites.
